


Peter Parley was the pseudonym which Samuel Griswold Goodrich (1793-1860) used for a very popular series of children's books. They were very widely copied and in his autobiography he described his problems with counterfeiters: *Recollections of a lifetime*, published in New York and Auburn by Miller, Orton and Milligan in 1856.

Peter Parley's Method of telling about geography to children first appeared in 1829 and was a best-seller, being reprinted almost annually for fifteen years. It contained nine wood engraved maps $90/5 \times 95/100$ mm., which were printed within the text with their titles above the top border:

(picture of the World, or the Earth); Western Hemisphere; Eastern Hemisphere; (Eastern Hemisphere reversed); N. America; S. America; Europe; Asia; Africa.

At the request of his publishers, Goodrich then produced a new edition (see 1845). In its preface it was claimed 'nearly one million of copies have been published in the United States' and 'nearly a dozen close imitations of it have appeared in this country' (see 1833c). Apparently, pirated editions were published also in England (see 1835a), Greece, Australia and Persia.
