William Murphy was a prolific Edinburgh engraver who usually signed his maps. His output included several pocket atlases (see 1825a, 1832a, 1832e, 1835 &1850a), including a classical one, which went through several undated editions.

The engraved title-page and contents list are followed by forty-eight pages of text, starting with a 'Memoir of ancient geography' which is dated January, 1832. An index to the maps follows, then a table of the principal mountains and rivers.



The work is completed by twenty-one numbered maps about 80×110 mm: 'drawn & engraved from the best authorities by William Murphy.' They are all finely done with lovely hand-colour and have Murphy's signature at the head above the top border. The plate marks and glimpses of dividing lines indicate that they were drawn more than one to a plate:
