The last of William Murphy's pocket atlases (see 1825a, 1832a, 1832b, 1832e & 1835) is a little one of the world, thought to have been published about 1850. The only copy traced is in the British Library (Maps 41.a.26) and it lacks a title-page. Measuring 150 x 120 mm., it is printed on thin shiny card and contains thirty-three maps about 100 x 130 mm. with outline colour, all drawn, engraved and signed by Murphy:

Western hemisphere*; Eastern hemisphere*; The World on Mercator's projection; Europe*; British Isles; England*; Scotland*; Ireland*; France*; Netherlands; Holland; Prussia; Norway Sweden; Denmark; Russia in Europe; Germany; Austria; Swisserland; Spain and Portugal; Italy; Turkey in Europe; Asia*; Turkey in Asia; Hindoostan; East India Is.; China; Africa*; Egypt; Palestine; North America*; United States; West Indies; South America*.

Outside the bottom border of each map is the imprint of the Edinburgh publisher, Myles Macphail, who succeeded Alex Macredie about 1844, but one third* of them are not numbered.
