



Jean Lattré, who had engraved the plates for Louis A. Du Caille's atlas of France (see 1760), went on to publish a similar work by Rigobert Bonne. This was the same size as his maritime atlas (see 1762) but thicker because it included Bonne's *Description géographique abrégée de la France*: 213 pages printed by Butard. It was to be more than a decade before Lattré's major rival, Louis-Charles Desnos, published his own miniature atlas of France (see 1775a). Bonne's version contains twenty eight numbered double page maps of gouvernements, about 130 x 100 mm., usually having outline hand-colour:
